OBJECTIVE

In today's lesson we learn how to correctly identify parts of speech such as nouns, verbs, and adjectives.

MATERIALS



Noun, adjective, or verb?

Grade 3 Parts of Speech Worksheet

Write whether the underlined word is a noun, an adjective or a verb.

- adjective 1. Place the open box on the counter.

2. Jeremy opened the door.

3. The opening is next week.

4. Later, we will go to the dance recital.

5. Will you dance with me?

6. The dance ends at ten.

7. Lydia climbed the play structure at the park.

8. The children play outside in the summer.

9. Norah invited you to her play.

10. Put your washed clothes away.

11. Dad washed the car last Saturday.

12. All dirty clothes go in the wash.

Hint:
Some words can be a noun in one sentence, an adjective in another sentence and a verb in a different sentence.



Noun: name of a person, place, or thing

Examples:

- Dog
- Teacher
- Book

Adjective: words used to describe nouns

Examples:

- Shiny
- Old
- Dazzling

Verb: action word or state of being

Examples:

- Sleep
- Eat
- Run

1. PLACE THE OPEN BOX ON THE COUNTER.

In this sentence the word open is used to describe the state of the box (noun). Therefore, the word open is an adjective.

2. JEREMY OPENED THE DOOR.

In this sentence the word opened is used as an action word. Since this is true we can say that the word opened in this sentence is a verb.

3. THE OPENING IS NEXT WEEK.

In this sentence the word opening is used as an event/thing such as the opening of a restaurant. In this case opening would be identified as a noun.
